## Extended Description:

This course will explore the relationships between the state and the society, from three major theoretical schools: structuralist, statist, and cultural perspectives. From these perspectives, the class will analyze the political activities of social classes, racial and ethnic groups, genders, elites, masses, gays, religious, and other groups. The course will explore how new trends such as globalization affect these activities, and as a result, policies on issues including welfare, health care, international trade, information policy, education, abortion, criminal justice, defense, foreign policy, and so on.
