Course Structure / Schedule : (3+0+0) 3 / 6 ECTS

Extended Description: This course is designed to discuss problems and issues in Turkish politics. The subject matter of the course is extensive, and it roots back to the period before the foundation of the Republic in 1923. In order to devote long enough time to the most recent issues, the course focuses on domestic politics with an emphasis on the post-1950 period. The lectures start with the early years of the Republic and the politics of the single-party period. The consequent topics include the transition to the multiparty system, the emergence and reign of Demokrat Parti, the 1960 coup, the social upheaval of the 1970s and the political consequences of the 1980 coup. The course continues with recent issues: Political Islam, Kurdish question, civil society, labor unions, the turban issue, Refah-Yol government, the AKP years and the 2007 parliamentary elections.

- Possess knowledge about the political history of modern Turkey from the single-party to the multi-party period, and the effects of military coups and constitutions on the Turkish party system.

- Acquire skills for writing critical reviews of scholarly articles on Turkish politics.
