Catalog Description: The concept of national security, and its relevance to government policy. The creation of national and international political conditions related with the protection or development of vital national values and interests. Norms and principles related with the contemporary concepts of security.	

Course Structure / Schedule: (3+0+0)3/6ECTS

Extended Description: This course introduces students to the area of security studies in general and Turkey's security policies in particular. First, the course provides a broad analysis of the concept of security and the norms/principles related with the contemporary debates about this concept. Throughout the semester, several approaches to national security policy making are discussed and some of Turkey's major national security issues are analyzed. Topics that this course focuses on include, but not limited to, the Kurdish Question, Islamic reactionism in Turkey, and Turkey's relations with the United States. Finally, the course is concluded with an analysis of how the future of Turkey's national security looks like in light of the knowledge that is acquired in this course.

- Understand the extent to which theoretical and policy-oriented studies in international relations are interconnected.
- Possess substantial knowledge about Turkey's national security policies.
