Course Structure / Schedule : (3+0+0) 3 / 6 ECTS

Extended Description:

This course is designed to introduce students to the theories, history, institutions, and policies of the European Union (EU). This course examines the evolution of the European Union since the foundation of the ECSC. It introduces several theoretical approaches to the study of the EU such as federalism, neofunctionalism, intergovernmentalism, and more recent approaches emphasizing culture and identity. In the last part, the course offers a survey of the basic institutions of the EU and how politics operates within and among these institutions.

- Develop a deeper understanding of the EU within a historical framework
- Understand the theoretical approaches that have been applied to the European integration process and to the politics of the Union
